





The House with Chicken Legs



Moor Movies at Winsford - New season starts Tuesday 5 September 2023 at Winsford Village Hall

Tuesday 5 September. Allelujah Cert 12A. Drama.

Stars Judi Dench and Jennifer Saunders. Based on a play by Alan Bennett. Allelujah is a warm and deeply moving story about old age. When the geriatric ward in a small Yorkshire hospital is threatened with closure, the hospital decides to fight back by galvanising the local community: they invite a news crew to film their preparations for a concert in honour of the hospital's most distinguished nurse. What could go wrong? *Allelujah* celebrates the spirit of the elderly patients, while paying tribute to the deep humanity of the medical staff battling with limited resources and evergrowing demand.

How do you find lasting love in today's world? For documentary-maker and dating app addict Zoe (Lily James), swiping right has only delivered an endless stream of Mr Wrongs, to the dismay of her eccentric mother Cath (Emma Thompson). For Zoe's childhood friend and neighbour Kaz (Shazad Latif), the answer is to follow his parents' example and opt for an arranged (or "assisted") marriage to a bright and beautiful bride from Pakistan. The rye grass across the Dulverton cricket ground has been particularly well kept, so croquet balls hit there should always run true. There's enough space for several full-sized croquet lawns and the ground edges the River Exe, with its hanging woods, a scenic background for enthralling croquet. All that is now needed are members ready to play, say, once a week. At last count around thirty have already asked to join. Everyone is welcome.

There are several family croquet lawns on Exmoor, plus two or three clubs; for example, Exford and Timberscombe, which are open to non-members. The latest entry is going to be the Dulverton club, which will cater for young entrants, as well mature players and wily experts. The 2024 season should see play in Dulverton on at least a weekly basis, April through to late September.

The standard international croquet lawn is 35x 28 yds (32x25.6m), although they can be of varying size—to suit age with skills. It can take around an hour of mallet-swinging to complete a match. Then there are the tactics involved; every player should have their own cunning plan, based on the more 'roquet' the better. Some old-fashioned players like to put a foot on their own ball when hitting a 'roquet', (banned by the Croquet Association in 1870).

In short, an afternoon's croquet can be entertaining, with plenty of physical and mental exercise. There's always time afterwards for tea and gossip in clubhouse.



Gently does it on Exmoor

Exmoor National Park Authority has announced the launch of Exmoor Strolls, an exciting addition to the array of 'top walks' available on Exmoor. These new step and stile-free strolls aim to make the iconic landscapes of Exmoor more accessible to visitors of all ages and abilities, while showcasing Exmoor's special qualities.

The Exmoor Strolls collection is a series of fifteen routes in twelve locations across the National Park, designed to provide gentle walks through the area's breathtaking vistas, picturesque woodlands, and idyllic vallevs. The strolls range from a third of a mile to two and a half miles and are graded, using the Miles without Stiles classifications, as



Exmoor strolls are our favourite short, more accessible routes (from 1/3 mile to 21/2 miles). They enable people with a range of abilities, and of all ages, to experience the moors, valleys, and coast of Exmoor. All the routes are step and stille free, and some are suitable for pushchairs and wheelchairs.

Wiveliscombe Street Market and Carnival take place on Sunday 10 September, with the popular carnival procession at 3pm.



The rewilder's tale

Born in Tiverton and growing up in Bampton, Yolanda Cruwys was always drawn to the beauty of the surrounding landscape. Years later, however, she learned that the landscape was largely the result of monoculture; if nature had its way, it would still be beautiful but in a different way. Now, as project manager of Cove Down Wilding, near Bampton, Yolanda is committed to restoring biodiversity to 300 acres high above the River Exe.

Although pets did not feature in her childhood, Yolanda loved animals but was advised that "working with animals wasn't a good career choice." She opted, instead, to study human psychology—until Bailey, her first dog, came into her life. "I had such a bond with him and that reignited my passion," she says. She changed direction, enrolling on a Plymouth University animal science degree, with practical elements at Bicton College. This included conservation, ecology, nutrition, genetics and anatomy, and volunteering at South Africa's Shamwari Game Reserve, one of the world's leading conservation centres.

After graduating, Yolanda spent several years working for a poultry and game vet. "I gained a valuable skillset but, long term, the industry wasn't really for me," she says. She resumed her studies on a degree in animal behaviour at Bristol University—where she met her future husband, Ben.

The couple bought a farm at Cove and began to explore different ways of working, which included farming deer. But six years ago, the arrival of daughter, Yohana, gave Yolanda time to think more deeply about how they could best care for their land, which was not ideal for agriculture. Rewilding, in which Ben's family are heavily involved in Scotland and Europe, seemed to be the way forward...

In 2017, Yolanda and Ben left their original farmhouse, bought the adjoining Cove Down Farm and, initially, continued deer farming. But in 2018, together with one of their neighbours who shared their enthusiasm, they embarked on a major rewilding programme. Two other neighbours have added land to Cove Down Wilding; this provides the space and connectivity that underpins successful rewilding schemes.

There's a good deal of misunderstanding around the subject, so we asked Yolanda to outline the basic principles of rewilding and how these are applied at Cove Down.

"Fundamentally, it's about nature recovery and ecological

restoration—creating more resilience, so that land becomes self–sustaining and resembles it natural state. We stopped farming deer and topping grass. Devon Wildlife Trust and Devon Birds surveyed the land to give us a baseline of what was already there."

Finding a balance is also essential. No fertilisers, or chemicals are used on the land; there's no cutting, and Cove Down is now home to Longhorn cattle, deer, Welsh ponies and Iron Age pigs, domesticated versions of wild ancestors that once roamed and grazed the land. "If we didn't have these large animals, the forest would eventually take over—nothing else would grow," Yolanda explains.

"We see it as working with nature. At present, 72 per cent of UK land is given over to agriculture and a third of that is used to grow crops for animal feed for livestock that are

largely fed indoors. Of course, land that is good for farming should be farmed but land like ours will benefit from a different approach."

The UK is one of the most nature-depleted countries, not only in Europe but in the world—we're in the bottom ten per cent globally. "We need insects and pollinators," says Yolanda. "Soil and the microbes in it need to be in good condition to support life. Since the 1930s, we've lost 97 per cent of our wildlife meadows, ninety per cent of our wetlands, and 73 million birds have disappeared from our skies over the last fifty years. How can we work together to make things better in a nature-friendly way?"

Devon Birds' latest survey identified more than fifty different avian species; beavers have arrived on the lower pond, and the landscape offers breathtaking natural beauty. The project is also part of a breeding programme to reintroduce White Storks, with a purposebuilt, on-site enclosure.

This year saw the opening of three luxury eco-cabins, another way of diversifying, but also bringing people closer to nature. "They are designed for year-round use," says Yolanda, "so they're ideal, not only for holidays, but as quiet spaces for creative people, such as writers or artists, who want to work for a time surrounded by nature."

The project also offers valuable learning opportunities and Yolanda is keen to develop links with schools and colleges. She hopes that



Cove Down will become a model for other landowners, inspiring them to consider rewilding as an option for producing food and income, while allowing space for nature to coexist in a balanced way.

Rewilding is for everyone

Want to encourage more biodiversity in your garden? Yolanda suggests:



Add water—a pond, boggy wetland, or water feature.



Add pollinator-attracting plants and trees, bird feeders, hedgehog highways, log piles and leaf piles.



Leave edges and borders wild, areas of lawn unmown. Mowing a pathway? Make it wavy to attract butterflies.



Trim hedges or hedgerows less often.



Avoid chemicals or fertilisers.



No garden? Install window boxes.



Local therapists offer advice on digestion

Our digestion is a wonderfully organised system, designed to convert the food we eat into the nutrients needed to sustain our body's function and vitality. From the mechanical action of the teeth and the muscular contractions of peristalsis, to the acidic and enzymatic disassembly of our nutrients, including the ecosystem of our microbiome gut flora, our digestion is amazing and complex.

Our digestive tract is our interface with the outside world at a chemical level, up close and personal. We don't tend to think of our insides like this, but anything that passes through us in this way is of the outer world. This system is protected by our gut lining and has the most intense concentrations of our immune system anywhere in our body. Being so complex a system, there are many complaints and disorders to deal with. Our therapists have some hints and tips for you.

Being omnivores, we are extremely adaptable. Because of this our digestion has a huge ability to cope when things start to go wrong. Aside from acute problems, this is why we tend to see digestive problems once they are very chronic and they can seem difficult to treat.

Poor sleep, cravings, even mood issues, such as heightened anxiety, or continuous upward or downward gas, can be signs of digestive problems, alongside the more commonly known bloating, cramping, diarrhoea and constipation. Further down the line, skin rash, brain fog and joint pain may follow.

IBS has been the umbrella term for years. I often meet clients who have spent years trying to find individual foods that might be 'the cause' of the problem. This strategy is usually unhelpful as it is the interplay between the microbiome and the immune system that has broken down in the gut. This requires a broader healing programme to resolve.

Medical herbalists are able to tease apart the differing symptom pictures for these broad disorders and treat and resolve them with the application of herbs, careful short-term diet manipulation and the individual's commitment. The initial symptoms and the root cause can be resolved.



Booking has now opened for all events in this year's Exmoor Dark Skies Festival. With over 60 events suitable for all ages spread between 13-29 October, this is one of the largest festivals of its kind in the UK, and makes Exmoor one of the top places to visit to learn about the starry skies above.

There are indoor and outdoor events run by Exmoor National Park Authority, organisations such as the National Trust, and local businesses.

Local astronomy guides, Liz, from Moor Wild Experiences, and Jenny. from Wild about Exmoor, will be on hand to guide you around the night skies at events throughout the festival. Popular astronomer, Jo Richardson, from Space Detectives, is hosting evenings at Exford, Simonsbath, North Molton, Oare and Kentisbury, as well as running children's activities at the Family Astro Party at Horner Farm. Astrophysicist, Professor Roger Davies, from Oxford University,

is presenting a lecture at Petroc College, Tiverton, and is also a speaker at a special event at Porlock Weir Hotel. Wildlife experts will be giving talks and experienced walk leaders including National Park Rangers will escort you safely under some of the darkest skies in the country.

This year Planetarium sessions are taking place at Tiverton and Dunster and there's a brand new 'Moonlit Walk for Exmoor' around Wimbleball Lake, raising funds for three Exmoor charities. Local groups are encouraged to take part.

Also new for this year are Yoga under the Stars, E-Bike Night Rides, and a Dark Sky Singalong. The brand-new Exmoor Star Baker Competition is being hosted in Porlock on 21 October and professional and amateur cooks of all ages and from all over Exmoor are invited to bake a cake inspired by Exmoor's dark skies. During the afternoon, the public are invited to view all the cakes, browse some local produce and craft stalls, and hear a few talks about the night sky and nocturnal wildlife.

Visitors might like to book a short stargazing

break at Simonsbath House Hotel or the Yarn Market Hotel at Dunster, or stay in an accredited Dark Sky Friendly business, while exploring Exmoor and attending festival events.

Jo Richardson has written a free guide to some of the best spots to stargaze and the free guide can be downloaded from the stargazing webpage (see below). Dobsonian Sky Watcher telescopes can be hired from the National Park Centre, where Celestron telescopes and binoculars are also on sale. The Dark Sky Discovery Trail is a self-led two-mile walk, under the darkest skies, and is a real adventure at any time of year, with 360-degree views virtually free from light pollution.

Visit: www.exmoor-nationalpark.gov.uk/stargazing to read more about all of the above including the October festival, sponsored by Airband. The festival programme is available free from National Park Centres at Dulverton, Dunster and Lynmouth.

What's happening in Dulverton in September? The short answer is...a lot!



On **1 September**, the programme for the second exciting **Dulverton Exmoor Literary Festival** is released and online booking opens. The festival takes place in Dulverton Town Hall on Saturday 18 and Sunday 19 November, with five author talks/

discussions on both days. Signed copies of the speakers' books will be on sale in a popup bookshop after each talk.

Three novelists are discussing their latest books at this year's Book Club fiction panel: Instagram's @theummumsymum, Sarah Turner (her debut novel *Stepping Up*, was a Richard & Judy Book Club pick), former *Blue Peter* presenter, Janet Ellis (*The Butcher's Hook*), and Hanna Richell (*The River Home*).

Local celebrity and MasterChef judge, William Sitwell, returns to the 2023 festival, to interview award-winning writer, Henry Jeffreys, author of *Vines in a Cold Climate*, about British wines. David Cameron's former SPAD, Julian Glover, author of the Government's *Landscapes Review: National Parks and AONBs* is discussing 'What is our countryside for?' with Exmoor farmer and writer, Victoria Eveleigh,

Travel editor, Miranda Taylor, is hosting a session on creativity with international portrait photographer, Harry Borden (Survivor: A Portrait of the Survivors of the Holocaust and On Divorce) and Albert Read, author of newly released, The Imagination Muscle.

In a career spanning over 40 years, retired ITV sports reporter, Dennis Coath, has interviewed many sporting legends, including Muhammad Ali, Ayrton Senna and Sir Alex Ferguson. 





He started nude modelling 23 years ago, answering a Job Centre advertisement for a life model at Stroud College for 11 hours a week. His wife thought he was mad but, within six months, Dave was modelling

at 54 different venues and even appeared naked on a Dawn French TV show! Dave is a crusader for life drawing, believing it a wholly worthy, modern educational art form, which should be available to youngsters in school from age 13 as a demystifier alongside their new-found awareness of sexual orientations and gender choices.

Dave and mate, Robert, can also be found busking in various West Country towns. They met in a production of *Jesus Christ Superstar* three decades ago and became firm friends. Robert is an accomplished life model and appears in some of Dave's art sessions but, between them, they write and produce folk songs, often with a

country or comedy twist, to perform live in small venues. They currently have a hit song sitting at number two in the international Reverb Nation comedy chart.

The Minehead Life Sessions are two and a half hours long, untutored and open to all on a drop-in basis, so there is no standard requirement other than enthusiasm, a pad and pencil and £15. Feel free to tell Dave you didn't recognise him with his clothes on. All welcome - just drop in!

A new bridge for the Barle?





A CareMoor for Exmoor appeal was launched this summer to help build new bridge across the River Barle, securing and improving a popular walking route between the iconic Exmoor landmark, Tarr Steps, and the village of Withypool. While securing access improvements for future generations, the National Park Authority's plans will also help nature by protecting valuable wildlife sites in the valley.

Dan Barnett, Access and Recreation Manager for the Authority, said: "The footpath, which makes up part of the long-distance walking route the Two Moors Way, has always followed a permitted path in this location. The path here has become very unsafe due to heavy erosion caused by flooding. It is also an ecologically special area and ongoing path erosion and sediment loss is not good for the river's fish and other wildlife. We plan to divert walkers onto the other side of the River Barle, where a public Right of Way already exists, by building a new bridge. This will ensure that the route is secured for years to come."

Sarah Bryan, Chief Executive of Exmoor National Park Authority said: "We're holding a raffle and there are some great prizes on offer—we are extremely grateful to local business such as Exmoor Forest Inn, Highcliff House, Westerclose House, Hillways Farm, Stockham Farm, Wellhayes Vineyard, Wild about Exmoor, Exmoor Distillery and Wicked Wolf, Exmoor Tea and D J Miles who have donated prizes."





From Conifer to Culm

Members of the Taw Valley & Little Dart Landowners Group were recently treated to a *Conifer to Culm* workshop, hosted by one of the group's members near Meshaw.

Delicious pasties made with meat produced on the farm were served and the cider was made solely from apples harvested from the farm's orchard, which is documented in the Domesday Book (1086). This workshop was one of a few activities delivered by keen landowners in this area of the North Devon UNESCO Biosphere over the past six months. They are delighted that Defra has recently awarded funding to enable the group to continue their events programme, organised via the North Devon Biosphere Foundation and Devon Wildlife Trust, until May 2026. (Defra's Facilitation Fund helps to bring together farmers, foresters and other land managers to improve local environmental outcomes.)

Farmers and landowners across north Devon are being called upon to produce food, while significantly improving biodiversity and locking away carbon on their land. The Taw Valley & Little Dart Landowners Group (with over 60 members) have come together to share their approaches, learn from each other and hear about government grants supporting environmental improvements, such as Countryside Stewardship and the new Environmental Land Management Scheme (ELMs), which is being rolled out in phases between now and 2027.

Culm Grassland is a priority habitat for Northern Devon, characterised by a high diversity of plant species and a varied structure that supports a

wide range of insects, reptiles, mammals and birds. The group saw for themselves how the Culm has naturally regenerated over ten years, managed through non-intensive rotational cattle grazing.

The conifer plantation had two successive crops, spanning 80 years, and landowners heard how the seeds held within the seed bank under the plantation would most likely have a viable lifespan of less than 80 years. Theories were discussed as to how the Culm area might then have regenerated without the landowner having spread seed or green hay. It was considered plausible that an area of original Culm nearby had acted as a donor site with seed blowing across, travelling via birds or within the dung and on the feet of grazing cattle who were moved between sites in their rotation of non-intensive grazing.

The site is now rich with life and supports a range of other species living around its edges.

Once here in northern Devon, visitors can use our web app, North Devon Explorer (www. northdevonexplorter.com), which highlights the fantastic experiences available in the area, while helping to reduce pressure on the popular hotspots."

Visitors to the UK's UNESCO sites are invited to breathe in the sea air of North Devon, the English Riviera, and Brighton and Lewes, or immerse themselves in the spectacular vistas of the slate landscape of Northwest Wales and the Scottish Highlands. They can dive into the literary heritage of Manchester or Edinburgh, scale the mountains of the English Lake District or the peaks of Fforest Fawr, uncover legends and folklore along the Giant's Causeway or Stonehenge, tackle the northernmost frontiers of the Roman Empire by foot or by bike, stroll around Bath, one of Europe's great spa towns, or a landed estate at Blenheim Palace. And they can dance the night away in an iconic concert hall in Belfast or at a festival under the stars at one of the world's largest deep space observatories at Jodrell Bank.

It's a common misconception that our volunteers are retired professionals: lawyers, accountants, counsellors, etc. Many are, indeed, retired, but we also have volunteers for whom it's an enhancement on their CV. It's absolutely not the case that we rely on professionals! People volunteer with us for many reasons, sometimes just to meet new people. We provide comprehensive training and ongoing support so whilst a professional background may be useful, it's not a requirement.

Not all of our volunteers train to give advice. Some undertake reception work and admin. We have recently introduced an email advice service so someone with hearing difficulties who could not handle telephone inquiries could still provide advice by email, which is proving to be a simple and effective way to help increasing numbers of people.

What difference do we make to people? To individuals and families, relief and peace of mind; but you may be surprised at the bigger picture. Annually, we produce Impact Reports detailing what we have achieved in a financial year. There is an overall organisation report, also individual local authority reports and town council reports. They make for interesting reading!

It's that time of year...

"We've booked a package holiday to Spain. It's our first time booking this sort of getaway and a friend recently had a terrible experience when things went wrong on a similar trip. What sort of help is available if something does go wrong?"

First, tell the company or travel agent you booked with as soon as possible so you're more likely to be able to get it sorted quicker. If you wait until you get home, you might get less compensation or none at all.

If the holiday you went on turned out to be lower in value than the one you originally booked, you can make a claim for 'loss of value'; for example, you paid for a de luxe room but only got a standard one. If it wasn't sorted out at the time, you can claim back the difference in value.

You can also claim compensation for any extra money you have to spend while away — perhaps the beach was a bus ride away from the hotel, not across the road as advertised. This is called 'claiming for out-of-pocket expenses' but make sure you keep all your receipts.

If big parts of the trip you booked didn't happen or services weren't provided, such as the cancellation of a planned two-day excursion

was cancelled with no alternative organised, you can make a claim for 'loss of enjoyment.' You can also make this claim if something happens that causes distress or disappointment—for example, the pool was closed the whole time. There are no strict guidelines on how much you can claim for loss of enjoyment but any claim you make must be reasonable. You can't get compensation if you simply did not enjoy the holiday or if the problem, such as bad weather, was outside the control of the holiday company.

Check the information you received when you made the booking to see what you're supposed toget. If you don't get the service you've been promised you may be entitled to compensation for breach of contract. You might also be able to claim from your travel insurance—check if your policy covers this.



Travels from Dulverton: Chapter 6

The Golowan Festival in Penzance is where we start our adventure. Steeped in myth and legend, banned in the mid-19th century then revived in 1991, this heady celebration marks midsummer and the Feast of St John. We arrived at 9pm on the Friday, setting off after work. The streets and pubs were already packed with revellers, fairground rides, candy floss stalls, live music, street processions, and ended with a silent firework display at about midnight. The Friday night procession was particularly magical. Locals carried candles, singing and drumming summoning the light of longer days, and chasing the serpent of darkness back into the sea until winter's return.

Living on Exmoor, it had been a while since any of us (including our dog who was a little overwhelmed by the hustle, bustle and noise) had been in such crowds. We had managed to park centrally in among the stallholders and fairground ride operators vans so, in the morning, deciding to move on, we made our escape. Swinging by Lamorna Cove, bypassing the old Lamorna Wink pub (a wink being a Cornish ale house where smuggled goods exchanged hands in Centuries gone by), and after a paddle in the sea at Porthcurno, we pulled in at St Just, a Cornish town with a dark historical reputation. St Just is one of the many beautiful, vibrant towns built upon the ashes of a Celtic settlement, merely feared for its pagan religion that for millenia had existed in harmony with the natural world.





During our mooch around the town, we spoke to a shopkeeper who had previously worked the Maysie Day stalls that occupy the Golowan Festival on the Saturday. She confirmed although a fabulous parade and well worth a visit, the crowds are exceptional, as people visit from all over the world. In light of this information we were glad for our decision saving it for another time perhaps.

After a wonderful drive up the north coast of Cornwall, we finally made it to the Cornwall/ Devon border. That night we camped at our favourite farmer's field at Northcott Beach, just north of Bude. Our view was of the undisturbed Atlantic coastline of Sandymouth Beach. A little girl in the neighbouring van insisted on watching the sunset; she said to her friend, "I watch the sunset EVERY night. Good night, Sun, see you in the morning." It's comforting to know the Celtic heart still burns bright in those who spend enough time basking in the sunshine, their bare toes wiggling in the green grass of a midsummer evening.
