

Upton church bell's incredible journey

After sitting silent for more than 150 years, an Exmoor church bell is ringing again —in an Australian wedding chapel. The bell, which dates from about 1550, once rang worshippers to church at Upton village and is now Australia's oldest ringing church bell. Cherie Reid, who built the wedding chapel at Kantara House in Green Point, New South Wales, said she rescued the bell from disrepair to install it 9,500 miles away from its original home. 'The whole journey [to buy the bell] has just been so wonderful. I do feel a bit of pride about the end result,' said Ms Reid.

When the original 14th century church of St James at Upton in Exmoor National Park was replaced in 1870, it was built without a bell tower. Its two ancient bells sat silent until being sold on—one to Australia and one to St Mary Magdalene church at Sandringham.

Ms Reid rings the bell at the end of wedding services at its New South Wales home. She said it had been difficult to source a bell in Australia. 'Most of them are for schools and there's nothing of the calibre of the one I sourced in the UK,' she said.

After finding the bell, Ms Reid had to fly to the UK to collect it and had to chase it to Cork in Ireland, where it was refurbished, before it was flown to Australia in 2016. I was a little concerned because the bell looked huge, said Ms Reid. After picking it up, we hid it in the garage so it wouldn't be stolen. But who was going to steal it? It was too big!'

The family had to use a crane to remove the tower roof, install the bell, and then put the roof back on.

Cherie Reid's daughter, Karina Reid, said that it was 'incredible' to hear the bell ringing. 'I remember the first time we rang the bell; it was the end of such a process and I truly thought my mum was mad importing a bell from the UK to put in her tower. I didn't really see how important it would be. From the first moment I heard it ringing, I knew the chapel would not be what it is without the beautiful bell. We have a piece of England's history ringing in our chapel.'



A tug of war tale

For anyone wanting to keep fit and active for life in an affordable way, while forging strong friendships in a welcoming environment, Joe Goodman and Dan Nicholls have the answer—tug of war! When Exmoor News met Joe and Dan, our youngest interviewees in this series to date, it was clear that their love for the sport is a deep as their respective Exmoor farming family roots. Not surprising, however, as tug of war, like farming, is in their blood.

According to Joe, from Lower Sower Hill Farm near Dulverton: 'I first got involved at a Young Farmers Club (YFC) tug of war event, where we were beaten by a women's team. I was pretty fit and wondered how on earth that had happened! I had to find out more...'

Joe, 34, started training in 2008, when the group had no coach, just a few helpers. 'We had enthusiasm but no direction,' Joe explained. This changed in 2009, when Brendon-based tug of war legend, Nick Skelton (not Nick Skelton, the Olympic equestrian...), became involved and started coaching the Anstey Tug of War (Anstey TOW) team. At that point, Nick was the only Englishman to have pulled for the Welsh national team—and he was a farmer. 'In the 10 years until he died in 2019, Nick took us to a high level; we became a really good South West team.'

Dan, 22, from Woodlands Farm, West Anstey, grew up in a family with strong tug of war connections, particularly through his father, Ronald. Like Joe, Dan became actively involved through the YFC, where he found a warm tug of war welcome. 'Farming can be quite isolating but we are extremely lucky, as tug of war gives us the opportunity to spend time with likeminded friends of all ages and different backgrounds,' said Dan.

The Nicholls family strengthened its local

tug of war connection when Ronald, who had worked for years with teams across the South West, became Anstey TOW's coach after Nick's death. 'Ronald has taken us to a new level that I could never have imagined when I started,' said Joe.

He and Dan were quick to dispel any assumptions that tug of war is only for super-strong, super-fit burly men. There are now as many women's teams in the UK as there are men's; there are 4X4 competitions—four men and four women on a team—and newcomers of any fitness level are welcome. 'We recruit many people who have never found their niche, sportwise,' said Joe. 'Tug of war can bring them out of their shell; after just two or three training sessions, you see them growing in confidence and competitiveness.'

Ronald's stewardship has led to a string of successes for Anstey TOW. 'Last year, in the national championships, we came second in the 4X4 and were in the two top teams in two weight categories,' said Dan. 'That qualified us for the British and Irish championships, where we came second.'

Joe and Dan also pulled for the Anstey team who won the 2024 national YFC competition, a continuing source of pride; Joe had pulled for the winning team back in 2017, as well as with Dan in 2019 and 2023. There have been other major competition wins too.

While they have loved competing at local, regional and national level, Joe and Dan stress that it's not essential. 'You take it as far as you want,' said Joe. It's a manageable commitment; the team trains for two hours every Tuesday and Friday during the season, which runs from March to October, or you can just go along on Friday evenings. Ronald is always on

hand to encourage the pullers—as well as spotting potential. And, unlike some sports, financial outlay is minimal...just one pair of special boots that can be repaired and that will last a lifetime. The only additional costs are travel, for those taking part in competitions.

As Joe says: 'It's got everything you could want in a sport; it's open to women and men; you can do it at different fitness levels, and you can improve. It's a true team sport—there are no stars. There's a saying that it takes eight people to win a pull, one person to lose it. Size is not an issue and there are different weight categories. There's a place for everybody on the team.

'And you can take part at any age; it's not about strength...it's about technique and being mentally sharp. You're pushing through your legs, not subjecting your joints to wear and tear, so you can carry on doing it for as long as you are able.'

Tug of war is one of the most ancient of sports. Archaeological evidence found in art and carvings in Egypt, Greece and India shows that it dates back thousands of years, as part of physical contests and festivals. In India, tug of war was linked to mythology and is thought to represent the age-old battle between good and evil. In China, where tug of war dates back at least 1,500 years, it was used

to promote unity and strength, and to ensure favourable harvests. (Good news for today's tug of war farmers!) In Norse mythology, there are references to a form involving the god Thor, symbolising strength and endurance and, across Scandinavia, tug of war was used in fertility rituals and to and mark seasonal transitions.

Here in England, where it had been enjoyed for centuries, the sport was formalised in the 19th century, with rules and organised competitions. It became popular in schools, in the army and police and fire services, and at public events, and was included in the Olympics from 1900 to 1920, with Great Britain's team excelling. But when a new Olympics rule was introduced, stipulating that each sport had to come under the umbrella of an international body, it was dropped, as there was no such body for tug of war at the time. That changed in 1960, with the formation of the Tug of War International Federation, SO the International Olympic Committee has had 65 years to reconsider! Given that breakdancing is now recognised as an Olympic sport, there must be a place for tug of war, not only one of the world's oldest sports but one of the most continuously popular.





11 February The Critic (tbc)

Opportunities for Exmoor's accommodation providers

Have you ever spotted a familiar Somerset location during a television programme or film? It wouldn't be hard, as film and television production companies spent almost £3 million across the county last year, more than twice as much as the previous year. Screen Somerset (part of Somerset Council) currently lists 68 filming locations across Exmoor, with many across the southern area covered by Exmoor News. This means growing opportunities for local accommodation providers—because film and television crews frequently need somewhere to stay!

Screen Somerset aims to make the county as film friendly as possible, assisting filmmakers in finding their perfect location and helping shoots run smoothly so they are keen to come back. It provides a single point of contact, local knowledge, and works with the council's highways, parking and property services. It is proactively promoting the county to regional, national and international location managers, working closely with Creative England's Filming in England Partnership, which promotes filming outside London.

Somerset's accommodation providers are being urged to make the most of this blockbusting trend by putting themselves forward as lodgings for crew, who often stay locally when filming. Visit Somerset is compiling a list of 'film friendly' accommodation to help productions quickly find suitable lodgings. Film friendly accommodation needs to be open to discounted group rates, flexible around changing schedules and antisocial hours, and have good parking and IT connectivity. Accommodation providers can put themselves forward for the Visit Somerset listing, completely free of charge, by emailing info@visitsomerset.co.uk

Film and television production brings big economic benefits and supports jobs, in the short term through the spend in the local area—particularly in the hotel and hospitality sector—and, in the longer term, through screen tourism when the county appears on screen.

Film and television crews need landowner permission before they can film for professional or commercial purposes; that applies whether land is privately owned or owned by Exmoor National Park Authority. Help for local charities and community groups

Are you involved in running or supporting a local charity or community group or is there a local cause that is close to your heart? If so, did you know that your group could apply to Tesco Stronger Starts for a grant of up to £1,500? 

Exmoor National Park supports the Sea Eagle

Exmoor National Park Authority (ENPA) is launching a white-tailed eagle public perception survey and engagement events, to share how it is partnering with England's White-tailed Eagle Reintroduction Programme, led by the Roy Dennis Wildlife Foundation RDWF and Forestry England, to support the species' conservation.

From 2019 onwards, the Roy Dennis Wildlife Foundation and Forestry England have been working to restore whitetailed eagles to southern England, through a reintroduction project based on the Isle of Wight, licensed by Natural England and NatureScot. A total of 37 eagles have been released to date and, in 2023, a pair bred successfully for the first time. The same pair reared a further two chicks this year, and three other territorial pairs of eagles are now established on the South Coast. It is hoped that this project will lead to establishing six to eight pairs of white-tailed eagles within 60km of the Isle of Wight.

To support the existing population of these incredible birds, the project aims to carry out a small number of additional releases and is working with ENPA to achieve this in the Exmoor National Park. The hope is that these birds will boost the emerging population of white-tailed eagles along the south coast of England.

The area has been identified as a key location after the presence here of several of the white-tailed eagles released by the project. Satellite tracking shows the

hirds' precise locations and, over the past few years, Exmoor has become white-tailed eagles hotspot, with seven birds different visiting. Many people have also been lucky enough to see the birds and logged their sightings.



White-tailed eagles formerly bred on the Exmoor coast, and the extensive areas of coastal woodland and abundant marine fish species, such as grey mullet, provide exceptional breeding habitat. Detailed research into the diet of the Isle of Wight birds has shown that they favour fish as they mature and begin breeding.

Zoe Smith of the Roy Dennis Wildlife Foundation, and originally from Exmoor, said: 'We've used the satellite tracking data, which provides extremely detailed information on the movements of all the birds we have released on the Isle of Wight, to identify the best areas to support the establishing population through a series of small-scale releases. This has shown that Exmoor is one of the key sites. We think that releasing a small cohort of up to 20 birds over three years would help reinforce the English population by aiding the geographical expansion, and we would like to know what people think of this idea.

'Eagles from the Isle of Wight have been frequent visitors to Exmoor over the

past five years and we know that many people have enjoyed seeing them. We can see from how people have reacted to the eagles over recent years, that once they get to know the behaviour of the birds it dispels any concerns surrounding this species. There's a common fear for example that white-tailed eagles could predate livestock, but there's been no record of this since the Isle of Wight project began. As their other common name, sea eagle, suggests, they prefer to hunt fish but will also eat birds (including gulls and corvids), small mammals and dead animals (carrion). For young birds, carrion makes up a large proportion of their diet but, by their third year, whitetailed eagles will gravitate towards wetland sites, home to their preferred diet of fish!

ENPA Senior Ecologist, Ali Hawkins, said: 'White-tailed eagles are an important flagship species in coastal ecosystems and used to be found right across the UK but are now one of our rarest species and listed as a species of Conservation Concern. Working with the Roy Dennis Wildlife Foundation over the last few years, we

have been doing a lot of liaison with local landowners and shoots regarding white-tailed eagles already visiting Exmoor. With its remote wooded coastline, deep incised valleys and abundance of food it's easy to see why the eagles are choosing to spend time here and people have greatly enjoyed seeing them.

'We'd really like to hear what people think about white-tailed eagles in our public perception survey and invite everyone to come to our events and to talk with the Roy Dennis Wildlife Foundation and Forestry England who are experts on these birds, and our Exmoor National Park conservation staff and rangers.

'We think that reinforcing the population of these spectacular birds would greatly support our work to make Exmoor richer in wildlife and return an important species to our National Park. Moreover, evidence from projects in Scotland and the South of England shows that eagle tourism is extremely popular and could be of great benefit to the Exmoor economy, especially in winter.'

Steve Egerton-Read of Forestry England said: 'White-tailed eagles are a truly iconic species. The positive reaction that people have had to them since the reintroduction project began in 2019 has been incredible. It demonstrates how returning lost species like this can reconnect people with nature and help support its recovery. We'd encourage anyone interested in finding out more to come along to one of these events and take part in the survey.'*

Exmoor National Park recently held whitetailed eagle information events and family activities at National Park Centres.

Somerset's new bowel cancer self-referral service

A new service that makes it easier for people to get checked for bowel cancer has launched in Bridgwater. It is open to people aged 40-49, who are registered with a local GP in Somerset.

Every year in the UK, over 2,500 people under the age of 50 are diagnosed with bowel cancer. It is often harder to diagnose through the traditional referral via a GP, with one in four people being diagnosed as an emergency, and often at the latest stage.

The main symptoms of bowel cancer include:

- bleeding from your bottom
- blood in your poo
- a change in your toilet habits—you might be going more or less often, or have diarrhoea/constipation
- losing weight
- stomach pains.

Traditionally, people would contact their GP if they had concerns, and they would provide a faecal immunochemical test (FIT), which looks for blood in the poo, even if it's too small for the naked eye. If the test is positive, it will indicate that there is bleeding, requiring further investigations.

The Somerset NHS Foundation Trust project team has been working with innovative cancer detection specialists, C the Signs, to use its cancer detection platform to pioneer an online referral form that allows people to check their symptoms. All eligible patients will be sent a FIT, and the NHS team will ensure that the results of the FIT are shared with the patient and, if required, further investigations arranged.

Somerset NHS Foundation Trust's cancer programme manager, Rosie Edgerley, said: 'Our data showed that there are younger people being diagnosed with latestage bowel cancer in Somerset, with the highest proportion being in the Bridgwater area. We also know that it can be embarrassing for people to talk about



their pooing habits with a healthcare professional, which is why we are working with a company called C the Signs to develop an easily accessible online referral form which checks people's eligibility and allows them to complete a FIT test, which if positive, will lead to further investigations.'

Miss Shelly Griffiths, one of the trust's consultant colorectal surgeons, who has also been involved with the project, said: 'This new service is an easy way for people to seek help for a problem with their bowels, without having to make an appointment to see their GP. We know that the earlier we find a problem, the more able we are to treat it, and we would encourage anyone with concerns to use this new service.'

C the Signs is a cancer prediction system that can identify patients at risk of cancer at the earliest and most curable stage of the disease. It has now been developed to allow patients with bowel symptoms to access their risk and recommend any appropriate tests. Using the latest technology, research and evidence, C the Signs enables healthcare providers to give their patients the best chance of surviving cancer.

C the Signs CEO and co-founder, Dr Bea Bakshi, added: 'At C the Signs, we are committed to simplifying the pathway to cancer detection and making it more accessible for patients. This initiative allows people to monitor their own symptoms and access crucial tests without the usual hurdles. By providing this direct route, we are ensuring more timely follow-up care, which can make all the difference in catching cancer earlier and improving outcomes.'

On average, 10-15% of people who complete a FIT test have a positive result needing further investigation. This does not mean that cancer has been found, in fact, 96% of people with a positive result do not have cancer.

GP and clinical director for the Bridgwater Bay Primary Care Network, Dr Harry Smallwood, said: 'In recent years, there was a feeling that we were seeing more young people diagnosed with bowel cancer. This was supported by evidence presented to me showing higher rates of bowel cancer in some areas of the county. The new pilot means we can increase access to this simple test and investigate patients faster, while freeing up GP appointments for other conditions.

'Seeing blood in the bowel motions can often be a frightening and embarrassing experience and one that patients can put off seeking advice for, hoping it will go away. Even if the test is positive it does not always mean a patient will have bowel cancer, there are many benign reasons why blood may be present, but firstly we want to exclude the cancer and investigate and treat patients faster, so they're more likely to have a better outcome.'

The new self-referral service will be available to people in Bridgwater and surrounding areas in several ways, including supermarket pop-ups, local businesses, workplace events (including Hinkley Point C) and localised advertising placements.

Nurse Parfitt bows out

In autumn 2024, Helen Parfitt, a nurse at Taunton's Musgrove Park Hospital retired after an impressive 48 years in the NHS.

Helen was always going to be a nurse—from the time she was in primary school and her mum was in hospital for 18 months. And what a nurse she turned out to be! Helen arrived in Taunton on her student nurse placement in 1976 and it was at Musgrove Park Hospital that she fell in love with children's nursing, inspired by Mary Lawrence, who was ward sister at the time. Helen went on to complete an obstetrics course at Queen's Charlotte's and Chelsea Hospital, one of the UK's oldest maternity units, where she gained experience in midwifery, before undertaking her children's nursing registration at Great Ormond Street Hospital.

'Going into nursing has been the single best decision of my life and, other than maternity leave, I've been at Musgrove Park Hospital for over 40 years. I can't believe the time has come to leave, said Helen. 'After completing my training in London, I returned to Musgrove Park to work on Ward 18, which is now Acorn Ward, and it's fair to say that so many things have changed for the better since then. For example, back then, mothers used to sleep on camp beds next to the cot, so we had to be careful not to fall over them when we went in to do the observations at night!

'Babies died of meningitis in those days but less so now that several vaccines are routine. Treatment has improved with cystic fibrosis too, with so many people with the condition living to adulthood, some even having children of their own. I'm not old enough to have seen the beginning of penicillin, but there was great excitement when we gave the "new" Acyclovir anti-viral infusion.'

Helen then left the children's ward to pursue her love of nurse teaching and set up the hospital's Return to Practice programme and an induction course for overseas nurses to gain UK registration.

'I helped nurses to come back in the profession so if I ever felt guilty about leaving hands-on nursing, I was consoled with the fact that I've helped other people into it!

'For my masters degree, I chose "registered nurses" use of infusion pumps" because we needed to buy new ones. After testing four different makes on eight wards, my 18,000-word dissertation concluded that any of them were acceptable...we chose the simplest, which also happened to be the cheapest, so everyone was happy.

'Florence Nightingale once said, "First...do (the sick) no harm", and literally thousands of nurses did the dreaded calculations test as part of the IV drugs assessment. I would like to be remembered as supportive, as well as rigorous.'

In 2009, Helen joined Musgrove Park Hospital's pharmacy team, as its first medicines management nurse.

'Early on in my time in pharmacy, I helped design prescription charts for children's pain relief and epidurals, adult acute pain, and variable rates of insulin infusion, and they are still being used today.

'After 40 years I dropped to four days a week and stopped being the "POD goblin" looking in the patient lockers to check the medicines there against the prescription sheet. The whole discharge from hospital process is usually pretty speedy, but it's important that patients go home with the right drugs. Part of my role has been to look at incident reports to see what we can learn to reduce to risk of errors happening.

'Five years later I stopped teaching the IV course, but have been pleased to still be involved in a project to extend this role to our registered nursing associates. I would like to think I have done my bit and am leaving somewhere near the top of my game. I haven't quite made my 50 years in the NHS, as I did a degree in English Literature before I began my nursing career. Now I've left Musgrove Park Hospital I don't have big plans to sail around the world, but I have started decluttering the house, as well as a bit of gardening. I'm just looking forward to enjoying life with a bit more time and space!'





Fraud Alert

People in Avon and Somerset have reported receiving fraudulent text messages, telling them to pay a fictitious parking fine. This is an example of 'phishing', when cyber criminals use fake messages to lure people to click on links within a scam email or text message, or give away sensitive information.

In this case, recipients are encouraged to click on a link to pay, which takes them to a website that looks convincingly like an official government page. They are then asked for their email address, vehicle registration and

card details to make a payment, usually £20. If you receive a text message like this, DON'T click on the link, as fraudsters can steal your personal and financial data to

commit identity fraud and take your money. Even clicking on the link and not entering any information could result in malware and computer viruses being downloaded onto your device. Report by forwarding the phishing text to 7726. This enables your provider to investigate the origin of the text and act, if found to be malicious.

If you have been coerced into giving away money or information to dishonest people, report this to your bank immediately (call 159 to be automatically connected to their fraud service) and to police via Action Fraud on 0300 1232040. By reporting you could protect many more people from being affected.

Thanks to everyone who has reported and brought this scam to our attention.

WhatsApp Scam

What does it look like? Fraudsters pretend to be a relative, friend or someone you care about. They may contact you via WhatsApp stating they have a new number due to an emergency and will ask you to send money. They will often claim that their phone has been lost or damaged, or that they are unable to access their bank account. The criminals behind these scams are preying on people's kindness and desire to help others in need. WhatsApp is more commonly used for this particular scam but fraudsters may use other methods of communication such as email, SMS, or via social media.

What should you do?

Call your relative/friend on the number you have saved for them.

Avoid sending any money until you are satisfied that they are not a scammer.

Where to report?

If you have been a victim of this scam, you can report to Action Fraud either online (www. actionfraud.police.uk) or over the phone (0300 123 2040).



If you have sent money as part of this scam, contact your bank to report the fraud.

My boss was telling me more about her childhood on Exmoor. Her grandma milked the cows and bottled the milk and then she and her uncles and would deliver it around the farm's local community. Every community had its dairy farm providing fresh, unpasteurised milk. The Dulverton cows walked themselves through the streets, to and from the milking yard. What a wonderful sight that must have been. There is a freedom to country life; the work is hard and the play is hard—so fundamentally different from urban life. It is more productive and yet also more efficient, as with the tortoise and the hare; the hare rushed around while the tortoise paced itself purposefully, allowing time to smell the roses as it achieved its goals.

A work friend's daughter runs a farm and we were lucky enough to source a meat box of fresh Dexter beef, grass-fed, loved animals; you can taste the difference. She says they talk to them and stroke them every day, culling two animals a year, one to keep and one to sell. We also sourced our turkey and pigs in blankets locally. Chutneys were exchanged, surplus fresh vegetables from gardens left in the canteen for others to take. We are also spoilt for choice for delicatessens and farm shops; Somerset's rich offerings filled fridges and shelves with preserves, cheeses, bakery, ready meals and even hand-made bunting and bags.

So here we are once again; goodbye to 2024, hello to 2025—enter stage left. Christmas festivities meticulously planned through the year have been in full swing, Dulverton by Starlight was a treat; we always say Dulverton was built for the purpose of Christmas, with its perfect town square, and the glorious church, its bells proudly ringing out. Starlight 2024 was no different, with mulled wine stalls, charity stalls, tasty delights and incredible hand-made crafts, all lovingly prepared. There could be nothing more Christmassy than walking through the streets with all the tree lights glistening, and shop fronts and cosy front rooms decorated and subtly lit by the warm glow of candles, wood burners and tree lights.

We raise a glass and say, 'Cheers! Onwards and upwards in 2025!'
