





Bampton Hidden Gardens 2025

The annual Bampton Hidden Gardens event for 2025 is scheduled for 28-29 June. This event owes so much to the generosity and hard work of the garden owners, who kindly open their beautiful gardens for visitors to share. As in a number of Devon villages, many of these gardens are genuinely hidden, and the weekend offers the chance to explore and be delighted at what is behind the stone walls.

Across Bampton, and into the surrounding area, there is a wide range of garden sizes and styles. In 2024, 19 gardens were offered, 15 of them within walking distance of each other within the town. Visitors easily reach their 10,000 steps!

Hidden Gardens tickets cover both days, from 11am-5pm, affording visitors the opportunity to pace themselves, and even to stay locally if they are travelling from further afield. Within Bampton, a number of cafes are open for breakfast, lunch, afternoon tea, or just a much needed cuppa. Several shops also offer takeaway options to sit and eat in the sunshine (fingers crossed), on a bench while admiring the floral displays around the town. These are planted and maintained by the dedicated volunteers of Bampton in Bloom, who run the Hidden Gardens event.

We look forward to welcoming visitors old and new, from near and far, to what is always such a lovely weekend.

The tower captain's tale

The sound of church bells ringing out on a Sunday morning, or to celebrate a coronation or wedding, or mark a funeral or the death of a sovereign, have long been associated with village life. But, as Oscar Hammerstein II observed, 'A bell's not a bell 'til you ring it...' and many churches now struggle to recruit new ringers. That is certainly not the case at St Peter's in Oakford, however, where tower captain, John Phillips, is proud to lead the team of ten enthusiastic ringers.

Unlike his predecessor, Bun Burrows, who rang at St Peter's for some 70 years from the age of fifteen, John came to bellringing relatively late in life. His wife, Patsy, encouraged him to have ago after the couple moved from the outskirts of Oakford to the heart of the village. John's local roots run deep; although born in 1944, in Poole, Dorset, where his father was an RAF mechanic during WWII, he has lived in the parish of Oakford, since 1946. He and Patsy, who also lived locally, met and married as teenagers and Oakford is where they raised their two sons.

Aged just 20, John went into pig farming on the family farm, overseeing its expansion in the 1970s. But by 1991 it was time for a change; he gave up farming to restore classic cars—mainly Morris Minors—putting the skills he had developed on the farm to good use. As he explained, 'A pig farmer has to be mechanically minded; I wasn't formally trained but was useful with my hands.' (John still owns and drives a Morris Minor...)

The couple moved into Chapel Cottage in the village in 2014 and Patsy decided to try her hand at bellringing. She enjoyed it and was sure that John would too. 'But,' says John, 'it was difficult at the start; St Peter's bells have a well-deserved reputation for being notoriously hard to ring!' He explained that this is because the church tower's current eight bells, which have been in place for 200 years, have no roller bearings and are mounted on solid steel shafts, some of which are oval rather than round.

The tower dates from the 15th century and its original bell (or bells) rang out across Oakford until 1549, when Edward VI's Lord Protector, Edward Seymour, Duke of Somerset, ordered the dismantling of Devon and Cornwall's church bells. The reign of staunchly Protestant Edward was short lived; when his Catholic half-sister, Mary, became queen, bells came back into favour—at a price. In 1553, she decreed that churches could have their bells back...but they would have to buy them. Oakford was a poor parish and could not afford to reclaim its bells; St Peter's became the only church in Devon with a silent tower. That changed in 1577, when William Hyllals Spurway donated £3 (the equivalent of just over £1,000 today) to buy a bell for the church. By 1760 there were five bells and, in 1825, James Parkin, the church's young rector—who would remain in situ for 57 years—presented St Peter's with a peal of eight bells, widely regarded as among the finest in Devon. Such a reversal of fortune.

In recent years, however, it became clear that the bells faced a precarious future. Their wooden framework was seriously dilapidated, despite substantial repairs a century

earlier, when the work included lowering the ringing platform by eight feet to floor level. The Parochial Church Council (PCC), of which John is a member, launched an ambitious appeal to pay for the complete restoration of the bells and a new steel framework. Without raising the necessary funds, the bells were at risk of falling silent—perhaps permanently.

Despite the challenges, John, by now tower captain, was determined to keep the bells ringing for as long as possible, while fundraising continued. And that meant keeping bellringer numbers up. While taking his duties, which include maintenance and health and safety, seriously, John has always believed that bellringing should be enjoyable and inclusive; some of the current ringers are in their thirties, the eldest in their eighties, and Monday evening practice is usually followed by a convivial visit to the village pub. They have recently welcomed Millie Hutter, who is just 12 and had rung at St Paul's, Tiverton. This March, Millie joined the Oakford bellringers at the thanksgiving service for the life of her much-loved grandmother, local farmer, Shirley Hutter, who had been one of St Peter's most dedicated ringers. It was the last time the bells were rung before restoration work began, a profoundly moving experience for Millie and her family, for John and the bellringers, and for everyone who attended.

'We are always happy to welcome anyone who is interested in joining us. You don't need to be a church member or even a believer,' says John. 'Apart from anything else, bellringing practice gives you a very good physical workout and it's fun!'

Meanwhile, the fundraising appeal has paid off. 'I'm so proud of what the village has achieved,' says John. 'The villagers have raised £50,000, almost half of the amount needed for restoration work, which is about to start.' The PCC awarded the contract to the Somerset-based foundry of Matthew Higby and Company—all the bellringers were involved in the decision-making process—and it is hoped that the electronically retuned bells and a new steel framework will be in place by October. A new ringing platform will be installed, in the original raised position. Villagers and regular visitors with keen ears will spot the difference; for example, when the retuned tenor bell is struck, the sound will carry for much longer.

'I wasn't taught so I feel very proud to be doing this...calling

the ring changes, which is quite challenging,' says, John. 'I feel even more honoured to have helped bring the bells back to life.'

As tower captain, John, along with village residents, has played a vital role in ensuring the future of Oakford's 500-year-old tradition; his dedication is now part of this hillside village's long history.

The National Water Safety Forum (NWSF) is a UK-focused, voluntary network, working collaboratively to reduce water-related deaths and associated harm. It brings together various national groups, with the ambition of creating a 'one-stop shop' for the prevention of drowning and water safety harm in the UK. Professor Mike Tipton, from the University of Portsmouth, recently began his new role as NWSF. He brings a wealth of experience and knowledge to enhance the forum's reach.

The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA) hosts the forum, with the following organisations represented: RNLI, Maritime and Coastguard Agency, National Fire Chiefs Council, RoSPA, RLSS UK, Water Safety Scotland and Water Safety Wales.

Recently, I was privileged to be one of the keynote speakers at the National Water Safety Conference in Birmingham. One hundred water safety practitioners, advocates, academics and educators from across the UK came together to share best practice and shape the future of drowning prevention. Speakers covered all sides of the water safety sector, from collaborative partnerships to technological advances, in an event that captured the breadth of current drowning prevention efforts. It was heartening and inspiring to be among so many people who are deeply passionate about their remit.

You may be reading this, wondering, 'What has it got to do with us, on Exmoor?' My response is, 'A great deal!' We have many bodies of water around us—lakes, rivers, reservoirs, canal, and the sea.

Following the loss of my son James to accidental drowning in 2005, I have become a staunch advocate for water safety. I have the personal focus that drives me to share our story, and I would urge everyone to take note of the national and local campaigns. Whether you are a 'toe in the water' paddler, a sailor, surfer, a paddleboarder, wild swimmer, jogger along the towpath, there will be messages to heed. Please, always #RespecttheWater.

Local Vineyard's Summer Events

Wellhayes Vineyard, a small family-run vineyard near the village of Clayhanger, south of Exmoor, that produces award-winning quality sparkling wine, has released details of a range of summer events. To supplement their regular vineyard tours, which take place on Sundays and Wednesdays at 3pm, they have launched a special vertical tasting of three years of the Wellhayes Sparkling Wine. As they make the wine on site from the grapes grown in the vineyard, each year is different; this vertical tasting provides an exceptional opportunity to experience how the wine has changed over the years, as well as the opportunity to taste wines that won awards at the International Wine Challenge and the Independent English Wine Awards that are otherwise no longer available. Full details are available on their website at wellhayesvineyard.co.uk.

The other major event that Wellhayes is organising this year is an English Wine Tasting to celebrate English Wine Week on Friday 27 June. This includes four still four sparkling wines from some of the best vineyards in England, to tell the story of how wine has developed in this country in recent years. Again, full details are available at wellhayesvineyard.co.uk. Early booking is recommended, as places are very limited.

In addition to these dedicated wine events, Wellhayes is also continuing with its concert series in the tasting room above the winery, which has become increasingly popular in recent years, invariably selling out.

Particular highlights this year are the renowned Brodsky Quartet, now in their 53rd year, and two young international piano trios. The Trio Sōra, is an all-female trio based in Paris, who won the prestigious Parkhouse Award in 2019; the trio's August concert is their third visit to Wellhayes. By contrast, the Trio Concept is an all-male trio from Turin, for whom this will be their first visit to Wellhayes. Prolific competition winners,



in 2023 they were awarded first prize at the Schoenfeld International String Competition in Harbin, China. Announced as 'rising stars' for the 2025/26 season by the European Concert Hall Organisation, they are visiting Wellhayes in June.



Musical memories and treats to come!

Residents of Dulverton and the surrounding area may remember the glory days of the Minehead and Exmoor Music Festival, when its summer week of fabulous orchestral concerts was shared between Minehead, Dunster and Dulverton. Well, we have good news for the music lovers of South Exmoor: Dulverton may no longer be one of the concert venues, but the festival is alive and sparkling in Minehead, under the baton of its new artistic director, Christopher Stark. This year's festival runs from Saturday 26 July to Saturday 2 August and is ready to welcome all comers!

Now in its 62nd year, the festival almost closed when Richard Dickins, its conductor for an amazing 42 years, retired after its diamond jubilee, along with most of the longstanding organising committee. But orchestra members and local residents alike were determined it should not die, so a new committee was formed, a new conductor found, and the festival was reborn to great acclaim.

At his festival debut last year, Christopher Stark's lively conducting style, with his feet almost leaving the podium at times, led him straight to the hearts of his audience—and there are more treats to come this year. There are three orchestral concerts with fabulous soloists, a chamber concert and a young musicians recital. This is the only time in the year when a full symphony orchestra comes to West Somerset, and it is truly something to be proud of.

From Avon and Somerset Police and Crime Commissioner

I recently welcomed the latest report, published in February, by His Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary and Fire and Rescue Services into the effectiveness and efficiency of Avon and Somerset Police.

One of my main responsibilities, as your Police and Crime Commissioner, is the scrutiny and governance of the police service. This means monitoring and challenging the Chief Constable to ensure that Avon and Somerset Police is delivering an effective and efficient service to you and our communities. The Police Efficiency Effectiveness and Legitimacy (PEEL) Inspection provides important additional evidence to support me in my scrutiny role and guides the focus of that scrutiny, alongside the main oversight delivered through my Police and Crime Plan.

I'm pleased that the report noted that Avon and Somerset Police were found to be good in two areas: preventing crime and police powers and public treatment. However, the report highlighted that Avon and Somerset Police is only adequate at developing a

positive workplace, and that their service requires improvement in five areas: responding to the public; investigating crime; protecting vulnerable people; managing offenders, and leadership and force management. These are all key areas I have already identified for Avon and Somerset to focus on, and they are also within the five priorities of my Police and Crime Plan, which gives me confidence that my plan is focusing on the right things—to deliver a more effective and efficient service for you.

I will continue to monitor closely the progress Avon and Somerset Police is making against all the report's Areas For Improvement, paying particular attention to the observation regarding the same areas that still require improvement since the last PEEL inspection.

I asked the Chief Constable questions around the report in a recent Police Question Time session, which was livestreamed through Facebook, LinkedIn and added to YouTube. You can find out more and watch the session back on my website— search 'PQT' www.avonandsomerset-pcc.gov.uk

Increased Council Tax

All our bills, including Council Tax are creeping up. There are, however, several options to potentially reduce Council Tax bills.

If you're an adult living alone, your bill can be reduced by 25%. Simply notify the council that you are living alone and the date that became effective. You will be entitled to the discounted rate from that date, even if it was some time ago. Some people are 'disregarded' when calculating Council Tax. This includes under-18s, full-time students, long-term hospital patients, people with severe mental impairments and many more.

Check if you can pay less council tax at:

If everyone in a home is disregarded the bill will be reduced by half. If everyone in a home is a student or severely mentally impaired, there will be no Council Tax to pay. If you live with an adult who isn't disregarded but who is on a low income or receives certain benefits you might be able to get a 'second adult rebate.'

If you or someone you live with is disabled and your home has been adapted, you can ask to be placed down one band. Ask your Council about Council Tax Reduction for people on low incomes. They will ask questions about your income and circumstances; if you are eligible, they will reduce the amount you have to pay. There are also different rules that apply when you've reached State Pension Age.

Check your State Pension Age: www.gov.uk/statepension-age

A 'discretionary reduction' is available whereby your council can reduce or cancel your Council Tax if you can provide evidence that you're suffering severe hardship and can't afford to pay your bill. If you don't get this, you can still appeal to a valuation tribunal who, if they agree with you, can order the council to reduce or cancel your bill.

Musgrove Park Pacemaker Trials

A groundbreaking way of monitoring patients' pacemakers is being trialled at Musgrove Park Hospital. It forms part of cardiology registrar, Dr Stewart Brown's PhD research, which is supervised by consultant, Dr Guy Furniss.



The project began five years ago when the cardiology team at Musgrove Park Hospital began to give patients with pacemakers a small monitoring device to use when they return home from hospital. (If a cardiologist detects that a patient's heart beats too slowly because of weakened muscles, they are generally fitted with a pacemaker to help support their heart rhythm.)

Dr Brown explained why he chose this area of research: 'The more that people depend on their pacemaker, the more detrimental it can be to their health, and it can cause heart failure—something that's been well known for quite some time,' he said. 'Most people with pacemakers tend to be in their 70s or 80s, and they might just put this down to ageing, but by using the data we're able to detect it early and bring people in for treatment to make them feel better.'

'Our cardiology service at Musgrove Park Hospital is unique in that rather than bringing patients into hospital to check their pacemaker, we send them home with a little device that they put next to their bed. When they go to sleep, the device runs a number of checks around midnight, and all that data is fed to us, which helps us to predict whether a patient's heart is failing in response to a pacemaker.'

'In many ways this is essential screening, where signs of potential heart failure can be detected early so the patient can have treatment before there's a significant decline in their condition. If this problem is detected early then we're preventing people from coming into hospital with heart failure; we know that if someone is dependent on their pacemaker all the time, it can make them breathless, so we can work hard to improve their symptoms.'

Dr Brown was originally planning to undertake a masters degree, but following a literature research, he realised that nobody else in the world had carried out this sort of research.

'I made the decision, together with my supervisor, Guy Furniss, to collaborate with the University of Exeter, and they used some of our data to develop a number of machine learning models with an AI approach,' he said. 'We're one of the first organisations to use this new technology for heart patients, as although we've used this sort of equipment in defibrillator monitoring, it's never happened in pacemaker patients. In effect, we've taken a tool that's been well researched and we've looked to use it for this very different cohort of patients.'

'We've just presented this work at a conference in Berlin and our global colleagues in the cardiology field were really interested as this hadn't been done before—a huge accolade for Musgrove Park Hospital. There was a positive reaction too, and a lot of interest from industry, as well as from other cardiologists who've seen some of the work that has been done.'

'Our aim over the next 18 months or so is that if we're able to develop a predictive tool that will give patients an alert if they're developing heart failure, then our cardiology team can give them a call to say we've noticed something not right in the pacemaker, and that their heart may be struggling. We'd invite them into hospital, possibly change their medication, and we can even amend their prescription to a more complex one.'

'This will make pacing safer, as there's a growing amount of evidence that shows some patients don't respond well to pacemakers. We don't know how to predict that at the moment, so this remote monitoring makes it much safer, and also enables us to respond to a patient who has a problem with their pacemaker. We look forward to including more patients in the study, as well as combining our efforts with other centres in the country to see whether we find the same patterns as in their patients.'

Dr Stewart is almost at the end of his third year at Musgrove Park Hospital, but he's been in the south west for around a decade, having moved from northern England, where he completed his foundation doctor training.

Pulhams Mill, Spring 1611

My name is James Wyndham. My father tells me I was born on the roof of a cottage in Watchet in Somerset, England. And that my mother, Anna, died of exposure after she was washed away by the 30-foot great wall of water that they called the Great Somerset Flood. It came through the Bristol Channel at 9 o'clock on the 20th of January 1607 and took 3,000 souls. My mother was rescued from the torrent by a brave fisherman's wife, Bethany. She brought her to safety in St Ducamen's church, on the hill above Watchet.

My mother died in at our home next day, 21st of January 1607. My aunt Bronwyn did suckle me for my survival. James Dunn took us back to Pulhams Mill in Brompton Regis. My only lingering memory of my mother is of a feeling of being held and loved as she passed away. My aunt, as my loving mother, brought me up and James Dunn acted as a good man and treated me as if I was his own son. He showed me how to be a good father, farmer and miller. I have two sisters, Laura, who is six months younger than me and Beth, who is 18 months younger. The twin brothers, James and Duncan, three years younger than me.

On the bright sunny spring morning of April 22nd, when I was four years old, I was collecting eggs from the ducks in the yard. A man on a very fine horse came to my home. The mill on the river Pulham, a quarter of a mile from the village Brompton. He looked very proud and frightening as he looked down from his high horse, made his stallion kneel so he was near my height and said very aggressively: 'My name is John Wyndham. I have come to take you home to Wyndham Orchard in Williton! I am your father; your aunt stole you from me four years ago.'

I love my aunt and James and didn't want go.

The man made his horse go down again. Then he picked me up and put me on the saddle in

front of him. So I bit his hand holding the rein and rolled off his saddle and dropped to the ground! The beautiful chestnut horse reared up above me and turned suddenly to avoid me. The ducks and chickens scattered. John lost his seat and fell to the ground. His hat fell on my face, but I still could see. He had hit his head and wasn't moving. The horse ran off!

I ran to find my mummy shouting: 'He tried to take me away!' She came running out of the kitchen to see what was happening. Bronwyn picked me up and held me close and James (my father) was in the field next to the yard. He saw what had happened. He jumped over the yard wall. His first instinct was to help the man, who said he was my father.

I shouted, 'Is he dead?'

James put his hat under the man's head and felt for his wrist. 'He's still alive.'

The man started to move. He tried to sit up and James held his shoulders to help him. But the man shrugged James off. Very angry! He tried to stand on his own, but his legs buckled under him! So, James put his arms under his arms and lifted him to standing. The man couldn't stand, so James helped him to the stone wall. He sat looking dazed. My mummy took me inside and put the kettle on the hob. Then James took me upstairs: 'This man can't take you away. He is your blood father, but he abandoned you when your mother died. We will keep you safe until you are old enough to decide if you want to go and live with him.'

At the time, I didn't understand how he could say he was my father as I had always thought of James as my father and Bronwyn as my mother, for they had always been there and loved me. Bronwyn sat me on the bed that I shared with my sisters and shut the door so the man couldn't find me. My brothers James and Duncan were asleep in their crib and Laura and Beth were playing near the pond

with a ball and sticks.

I looked out of the window from behind the curtain. The man was still sitting. He got up when Bronwyn came out with some water for him. He suddenly came to life and knocked the water out of my mummy's hand and demanded her to 'Fetch my son. He should be called John after me. You did not tell me you were going to call him James. Bring him here at once! I will call the constable to arrest you for taking my son.'

James stood in front of Bronwyn to protect her. The man was still doddering, and James (much bigger and stronger than the man) got hold of him and walked him away from the mill. Just then his horse trotted back. James managed to catch the reins and lifted the man over his shoulder and then like a rag doll, threw him up and over the saddle, slapped the chestnut on the hind quarters and the horse galloped off with the man hanging on for his life.

I ran down the stairs as I could see that man had gone.

Bronwyn picked me up and gave me a big hug. 'I'm not going let that man take you away. You know now that your mummy died four years ago just after you were born. She was very cold from the big flood. She was washed away but managed to hold on to a piece of wood and was saved from drowning by the lady she had been visiting, the vicar's wife. It was Anna's wish that me and James should love you and be your mother and father.

'We have kept our promise to her. We love you as much as we love your brothers and sisters.'

Grief and Loss are terms we frequently hear but what do we know what they mean?

In summary: bereavement is the death of someone. Loss is the change caused by the loss of something or someone significant such as loss of health or job. Grief is the emotional, behavioural and cognitive process in response to the bereavement and loss. Grieving is a highly individual experience; there is no right or wrong way to grieve and is a natural response to loss. How you grieve depends on many factors including your personality, your life experiences, your cultural and or religious beliefs, and how significant the loss was to you.

The common symptoms of grief are:

- shock
- panic
- sadness or depression
- anger
- fear or anxiety
- guilt
- relief
- numbness
- abandonment

- crying—often when you least expect it
- aches, pains and headaches
- loss of appetite
- tiredness.

Remember grief comes and goes; it's a rollercoaster of emotions so it's important to keep talking about your loss. If you notice your symptoms have been ongoing for a long time, are more frequent and/or worsening then seek professional help from your GP or a counsellor.

It is amazing that two tiny cells combine to create a whole human—ten fingers, ten toes, a heart, a brain, and everything that make us who we are. The female body does an incredible job at growing then birthing a little human.

From puberty, our bodies prepare for pregnancy. By the time many people realise they're pregnant, the baby may already have a brain, nervous system, and beating heart—developed in just five weeks! Changing hormones can

cause early symptoms like fatigue, frequent urination, tender breasts, nausea, and sickness.

By week 13, (the second trimester), energy levels often rise. The baby now moves, swallows, and even smiles. Over the next weeks, they grow fine hair, hiccup, and develop hearing—listening to the heartbeat, digestion, and voice.

Improving care for people with diabetes

Colleagues at Somerset NHS Foundation Trust involved in caring for people with diabetes have been praised, as part of a national initiative that aims to improve services across the country.

The trust's consultant endocrinologist, Dr Alex Bickerton, and diabetes nurses, Ruth Hammond and Emily Harrod, all from Yeovil Hospital, took part, while consultant endocrinologist, Dr Isy Douek, represented Musgrove Park Hospital's diabetes service.

Emily Harrod explained: 'The main aim of this National Diabetes Audit (NDA) Quality Improvement Collaborative (QIC) was to address the significant gaps in the use of insulin pumps among individuals with type 1 diabetes.

'Published data shows that around 90,000 people in England and Wales with blood glucose (HbA1c) levels greater than 69 mmol/mol are not using insulin pumps, which highlights the inequalities based on the person's location, gender, age, ethnicity, and socioeconomic status.

'To tackle this issue, specialist teams set up a monthly meeting to discuss and implement quality improvement strategies. Our primary objective at Yeovil Hospital was to enhance data collection, so we could identify patients eligible for insulin pump therapy, as well as to establish a streamlined pathway for their treatment.

'At the time, we were anticipating a technology appraisal from NHS England, which outlines a five-year plan for introducing hybrid closed loop systems—integrating insulin pumps with continuous glucose monitoring—for eligible patients. The NDA QIC initiative made a huge difference in helping us to refine our service, ensuring that we can offer advanced technology to patients in a structured and equitable manner.

'This approach, alongside the technology appraisal, increased the number of individuals using this technology, resulting in improved diabetes management and overall wellbeing.'

Dr Douek added: 'Being part of this project enabled us to review our service at Musgrove Park Hospital, and we quickly realised that our diabetes nurses and dieticians were spending a lot of time on administration and technical support. This led to us appointing a diabetes support worker, which has made a huge difference to both patients and the team, and we were also able to review our pump pathway and implement a hybrid closed loop pathway.

'The new NICE technology appraisal requires much more data collection and quarterly uploads centrally, to ensure that patient funding continues. We therefore also updated a database for use across both our acute hospitals to facilitate this.

'We also received a commendation from the national quality improvement team for our work to improve the care of people living with diabetes, something we're really proud of.'

Diabetes UK thanked the trust for taking part in the qualitative improvement collaborative programme.

Michael Sykes, the National Diabetes Audit quality improvement lead, added: 'We highly commend your team for collaborating, sharing and supporting people living with diabetes.'

The Golden Hour






